Property rights are broad in scope because they are often immeasurable. 1856 Wynehamer

vs. People, New York Court of Appeals "declared that alcoholic beverages had long been considered as property and represented an important article of commerce", addressing the value of property rights within the framework of livelihood and service to the public. Disavowed by teetotalers but significant to a free society, it was important to the sustainability of our inalienable rights: Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. While pure in intent, the 18th Amendment contrasted case law by highlighting a response to alcoholism – repealed by the 21st Amendment -. Nine years later, another property issue came before the States. Republicans answered it with Abolition.

President Lincoln and many other white Republicans came to believe the practice and tradition of slavery was evil. They were cognizant to the social landscape but without emotion, revered our framers, respecting States' duty to independently legislate the matter. Conversely, debate in Congress did not go without a fight from the Southern Democrats who sought to keep their [human] "property". The Founding Fathers, as British citizens, lived under the understanding, established by philosopher John Locke, that they had the "inalienable rights" to "life, liberty and property". "By "property," Locke meant more than land and goods that could be sold, given away, or even confiscated by the government under certain circumstances. Property also referred to ownership of one's self, which included a right to personal wellbeing. Jefferson, however, substituted the phrase, "pursuit of happiness," which Locke and others had used to describe freedom of opportunity..." (https://www.crfusa.org/foundations-of-our-constitution/natural-rights.html). Jefferson broadened the definition, it seems, to "pursuit of happiness" to be more encompassing. There can be no doubt however that Jefferson and others were very aware of the benefits of owning property. In the original Constitution, the only people who could vote, were male citizens over the age of 21 who were property owners. Clearly, that needed to be changed, so that all adult citizens could vote (thus the 14th Amendment). Have we ever considered why property ownership was so important to the Founders?

Many phrases are used commonly today that emphasize the importance of "property" in the Locke sense of the word:

"taking ownership", "you need to own your mistakes", "you break it, you buy it", etc. If you do an internet search for ownership phrases, you'll find dozens. In the broadest sense of the word, ownership means that you have a vested stake in something. Very few of us would own property and let it become a waste or lose value through our carelessness. Noone has a greater stake in the success of a business than the owner. A revolutionary invention or idea can be patented, giving the "owner" the opportunity to bring some great new advancement to a free marketplace, benefitting the creator and improving the lives of the buyers. Ownership most often represents a multi-layered investment of time, capital and often years of emotion and effort. That level of investment will be much more likely to produce positive and profitable outcomes than "renting".

Back to the question, why was property ownership so important to the Founders? It represents one of the highest forms of freedom. In a world where that majority of property was owned by the aristocracy, the opportunity to own your own land has drawn millions of people here to pursue the American Dream. The right to own your own four walls, regardless of size is often the focal point of our "pursuit of happiness", not just in the U.S., but world-wide. It is a human desire--a God-given right. And it provides great benefit to society. Property owners are much more likely to be invested in the care and upkeep of their property. They are more likely to vote and be involved in the governance of society. They are more likely to be financially stable. This is not a criticism of renters--we've all been there at some point. There are great, responsible renters just like there are lousy renters and lazy owners. owners and small business owners. Large corporations don't pay taxes; they pass that cost onto their customers. Renters do pay property taxes indirectly and are often unaware of how voting to raise property taxes affects the cost of living, the cost of renting and hurts their ability to purse home ownership of their own.

As a philosophical exercise, I have always wondered why government entities feel it is necessary to enforce permitting for citizens to build a home on land that they own, for example. Would it benefit the home owner to build a home that would fall down around his ears? Whose problem would it be? What restaurant owner would be benefitted by serving food that would make her customers sick? How long would her business stay open? How many doctors would practice for long if their patients had horrible outcomes, including death? Has it removed the accountability that ownership would require of us by nature and replaced it with red tape and interference? There are no easy answers to these questions, but our job as adults is to ask the hard questions. Most people will tell you that you should never buy a used rental car. We all know why. Have we become a nation with a renter's mentality or are we owners? It is our fundamental right to "pursue happiness" (i.e. own property) that has created the American Dream. We set that aside at our own peril. Private ownership on every level benefits our society. Every law, tax, regulation enacted should be contemplated within that framework, but it rarely is. CURRENT EVENTS: MASKS IN SCHOOL MOOT? Wait for it...

Natalie Poulson has served as a special education specialist in the Spokane area for eighteen years. Last November she joined the Finch Elementary Principal in a peaceful protest against the state's mask mandate. She was put on administrative leave for failing to "wear her mask correctly". Subsequently, she was afforded only one meeting but on three separate occasions attempted to introduce refutable evidence to Spokane School District 81. Ms. Poulson cited forty-seven different studies done by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) which stated that masks are not effective in preventing the transmission of Covid-19; aligning with Fauci's 2019 preliminary report. She presented additional supporting evidence as to the emotional and medical impairment masks are having on our youth. By the way; Q: How much in Covid-19 relief funds is there to improve circulation in the schools? A: \$145 million.

The school board never responded.

Reports state that as of March 21st 2022 our children will no longer be forced to wear masks in school. Does this render Ms. Poulson's concerns moot? Well, don't get too excited. Democrats exploit Covid and there is a bit more fear left to be squeezed from the virus. Are we to believe they suddenly follow the science? The timing is auspicious. Pending elections?



We are approaching the two-year anniversary of Governor Inslee's emergency proclamation 20-05. Yes, you read that correctly, two years. Two years of rule by executive fiat. Two years of covering faces, limiting capacities at events, and keeping six feet of distance between each other. Two years of treating other people as dangerous pathogenic vectors of disease.

Washington law is clear that a state of emergency should not be an indefinite means of circumventing democratic processes: the chapter concerning gubernatorial power provides "[t]hat the governor *must* terminate said state of emergency proclamation when order has been restored in the area affected." *RCW 43.06.210* [emphasis added].

If "order" has not been restored in Washington already, then I do not know when it ever will be. This last NFL season, we had an average of 68,408 screaming Seahawk fans in Lumen field for eight home games. We have had more than 17,000 fans in each of the Kraken's 27 home games so far this season. The last three games of the Mariners season each had more than 44,000 fans at Safeco Field. If activities as superfluous as professional sports are back in full swing, then surely order has been restored.

The arbitrariness of the mask mandates plaguing Washington over the past two years have culminated with the announcement that they will end in a little more than a month from now. Why? Because the science says so. With little regulation on type of mask you must wear (cloth, gaiter, surgical mask, shields, N95), will make it impossible to know if mask mandates actually worked in the first place yet, we can dispense with them ALL in one month. Never mind we have been subjected to the control and dictates of the Secretary of Health for two years with no scientific or legal basis; do as you're told; the science says so.

Perhaps the most egregious overreach of this emergency has been the vaccine mandates. Not only have people lost

The erosion of trust in public health will last longer than this emergency order. The endemic nature of coronavirus will forever be a reminder that you cannot control your own health decisions. Health care workers being fired in the midst of a pandemic so dangerous it requires forcibly vaccinating the population is an optic from which public health may never recover.

One is left to wonder, if the vaccines are truly "remarkable [and] life-saving" as described in Governor Inslee's vaccination requirement order, and 72.7% of the population aged 5 and up is vaccinated, why are we still operating under the draconian rule of the past two years? Remember, Gov. Inslee originally stated that 70% vaccination uptake among the population aged 16 and older was the threshold for reopening. Maybe it's as simple as looking north of the border to understand why we will never be able to comply enough to satisfy our liberal betters.
